CERAMICS. 3D ART STUDENTS GO THROUGH SPECIFIC STEPS TO CREATE ART PIECES



STEP 1: WEDGING

In preparation for her clay project, senior Kylee Ruf wedges the clay so that it is ready for her when she begins to mold. All students started off wedging the clay to prevent air pockets from forming and to keep the clay smooth and moldable.

STEP 2: MOLDING

In Ceramics, junior Madalyn Wimberly creates a clay figure on the wheel to start the process of molding a shape. She slowly shaped the clay outward to create a bowl.

STEP 3: DETAILS

Junior Kayley Gilman carefully etches designs onto her clay pot. "I enjoy putting a lot of detail into things to make them look realistic," Gilman said. "The details are both my favorite and my least favorite part. It was really time consuming to make the stitching but once I got it to look right, it felt good that all my hard work paid off."

STEP 4: UNDERGLAZING

Before the clay goes into the fire, senior Jared Bast paints his bowl with underglaze to make sure the designs on his pottery come through.

STEP 5: GLAZING

Freshman Emma Becker works on glazing her clay project before it goes in the fire one last time to create the glossy, bright-colored effect of the clay in the final product. "My style is very vibrant," Becker said. "I like working with bright colors that make my work pop, and it says a lot about who I am as a person."
