

Llama evacuation required during trip

Middle school trips were back in full swing following the hiatus due to covid, starting with the eighth grade trip to Buena Vista, Colorado. Unlike previous years where the students stayed exclusively in Noah's Ark, students spent three days backpacking through the Rocky Mountains and camping in the woods. To help students with all of their luggage and paraphernalia, each hiking group was assigned two Ilamas to carry the tents. However, some Ilamas may have been more than the students bargained for.

One particularly stubborn llama refused to continue the hike, forcing the group to tie it to a tree, only to wait for an evacuation team to come and retrieve the llama.

"It was getting dark and we needed to go," eighth grader Kate Lewis said. "It was a little weird because, you know, you don't really hang out with llamas every day".

Despite the hail and increased load the Middle School Chaplain Matt Stroud's hiking group had to carry, students grew closer and realized they could do more than they thought possible.

"When everyone kept going and didn't complain, that was really surprising to me," Stroud said. "Our group found out how much the llamas were carrying the hard way."

Completely back to normal from the Covid years, middle school trips picked back up as sixth, seventh and eighth graders traveled to Washington D.C., Camp Champions and Colorado, respectively. The D.C. trip included new visitations to historical Yorktown and dance parties at Rhodeside Grille, while, for the first time, the Colorado trip had llamas accompany them.
