DESCRIPTION: This photoshoot was for our newsmagazine's photo issue, only done once per year. I used my off-camera flash gear to get soft and pleasing Rembrandt lighting. It was fun working with Chyu as she played her violin with great skill.

DESCRIPTION: I shot from a sitting position on the floor at the corner of the court with my sharpest lens, a prime 50mm f/1.8. I was able to freeze Calvert midair, while the low shooting position allowed for the large Ladue student section — intently watching the action — to fit perfectly in the background.
