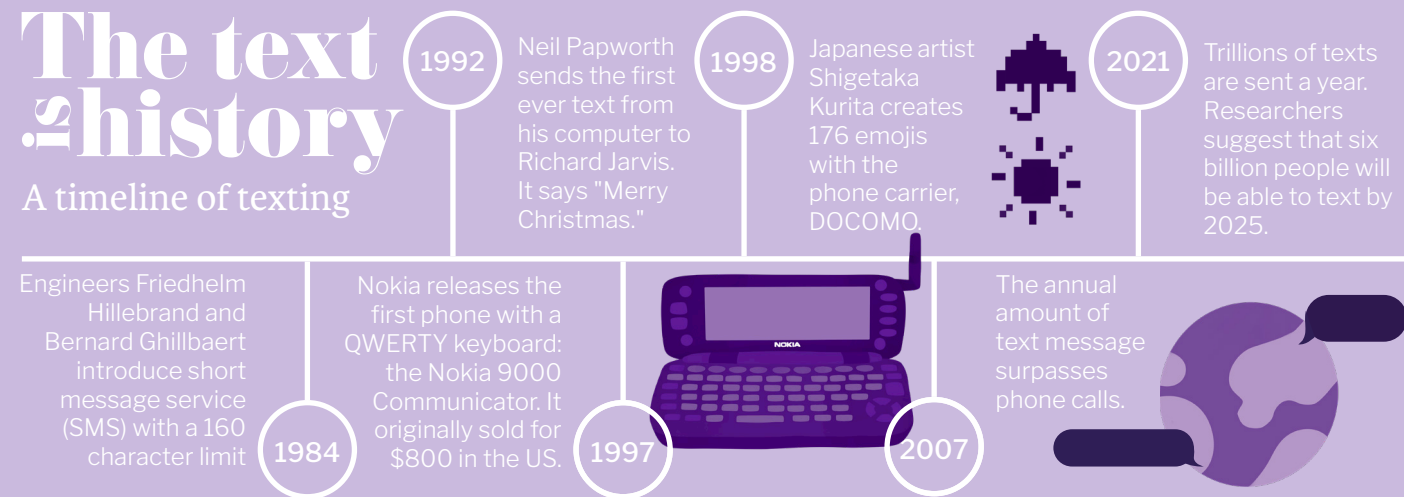

1 Late responses

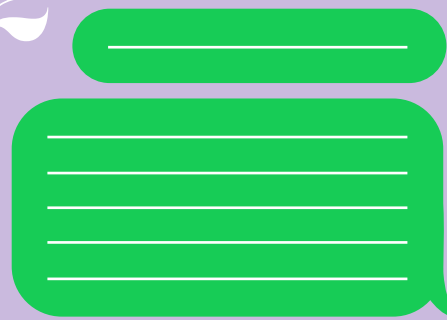

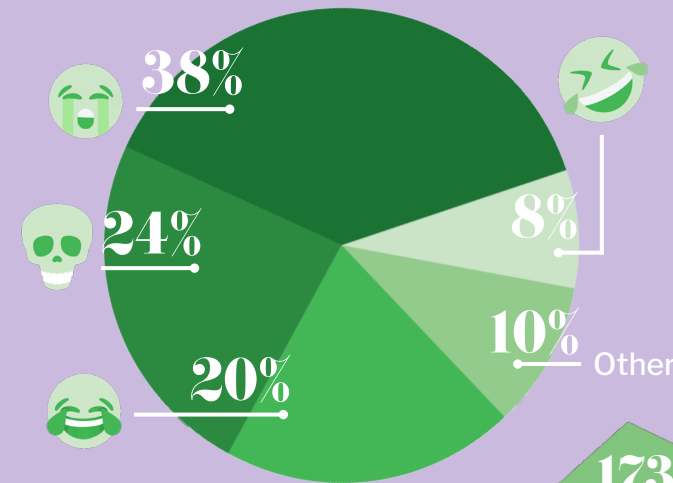

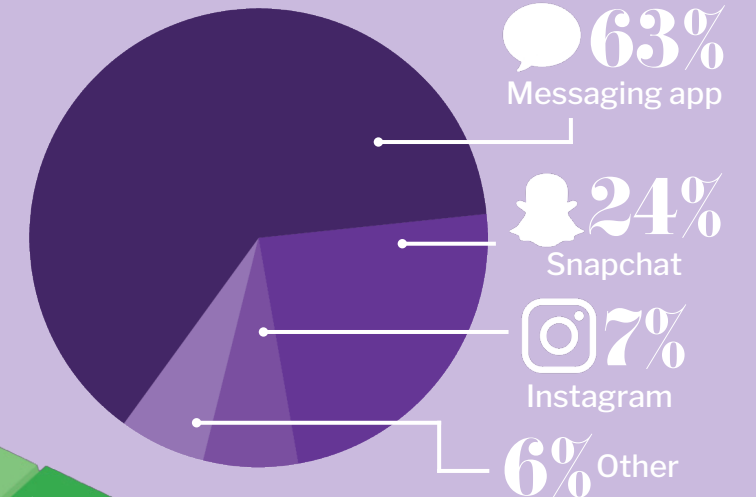

Most used laughing emoji

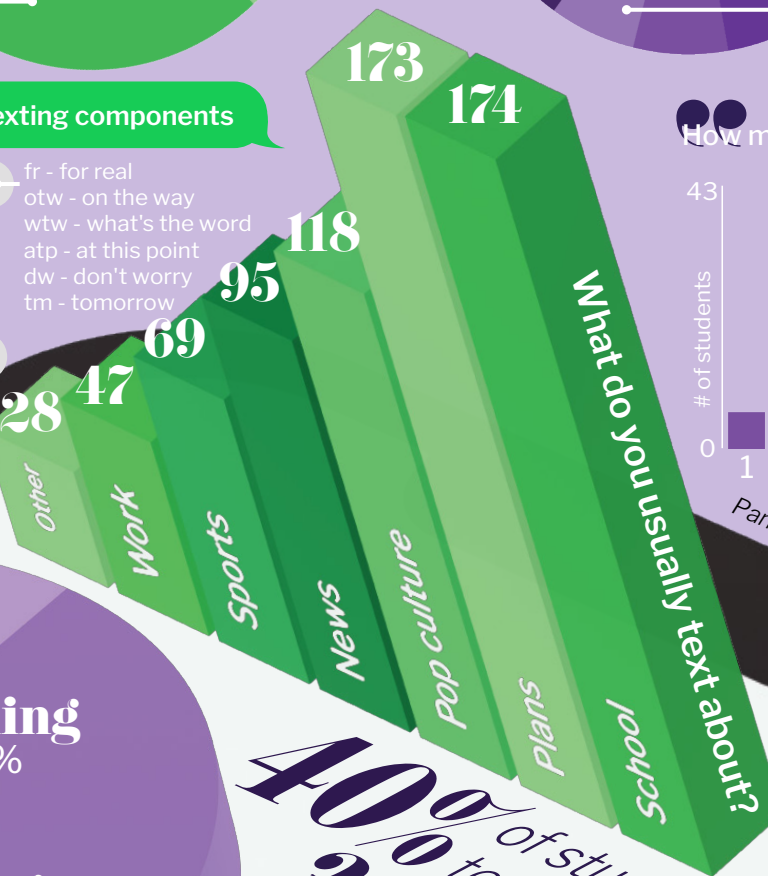


Most used apps for texting

Panorama surveyed 215 students Nov. 23

Texting 46%

Emailing 3%

Talking in-person 43%

40% of students reply to their texts right away
39% of students reply within an hour
21% of students take more than a few hours to respond
