a perfect 10-0 and then 4 more

After an 11-2 season in 2016, the varsity began the 2017 season with a loftier goal: to match the 1966 team's undefeated regular season and state quarterfinal appearance: "We knew we had something special this year," senior linebacker JB Faught said. "Coming out with a win over Anderson proved it."

With nondistrict victories over Lehman, Seguin and Akins, the team arrived at 4-0, the same record it had after four games a year ago. To get to 5-0, the team had to get through LBJ, the only district team that beat them in 2016. Before a packed crowd at Nelson Field on Sept. 29, the Knights led by five points in the game's closing moments when the Jags faced a fourth down on the Mac 10-yard line. A Jag receiver caught a pass and seemed headed for the game-winning touchdown when senior Tyrell Washington tackled him on the 3-yard to save the game and the team's unbeaten streak.

"Winning the LBJ game was our goal since freshman year," senior Davis Roe said. "We gained a lot of confidence from that game that helped fuel us for the rest of the season."

The Knights cruised through their next six games, winning them by an aggregate score of 300-19 to end the regular season 10-0 for the first time since 1966.

"The hype near the end of the playoff run was insane," senior Jackson Masters said. "We had local news covering our practices. AJ and I were on the radio; we had interviews after games, people in newspapers were writing about us. It was just really cool to be put in the spotlight like that. There was definitely some added pressure for me and for everyone. I didn't want to let anybody down."

The Knights lost the round-one coin toss and had to travel to Castroville, where they beat the Medina Valley Panthers, 37-14, to

advance to the second round. The day after Thanksgiving, Knights boarded charter buses and went to Navasota to play Rosenberg Terry. At halftime, the team held a seemingly comfortable 11-point lead. If they could hold onto it, they would set the record for most wins in a single season. The team's 12th victory was secured in the third quarter when Faught blew up an option play, creating an errant pitch that junior defensive back Gabe Williams recovered and ran for a 44-yard touchdown. After the 52-24 win, the Knights were headed to the Alamodome and a date with the Alice Coyotes, the same team that ended the Knights' historic season in 1966.

With members of the 1966 team present, the 2017 Knights avenged the 51-year old loss, scoring 33 unanswered points to cage the Coyotes 33-8, and advance to the 5A D2 quarterfinal where they faced Calallen, the team favored to win the state title. The Knights ambushed the Wildcats from the beginning, taking a 20-0 lead that the defense protected throughout the second half. After a 20-7 final score, the Knights were in the 5A Division 2 Final Four.

"As a whole our defense played great, and shutting down a great offense like that is just fun," Masters said. "We were all playing our hearts out and really just playing for fun and for each other."

At NRG Stadium in Houston, the Knights took on the College Station Cougars. The Knights gave it their all but came up short, losing 49-21 to the eventual 5A D2 state champs.

The loss ended the season but did not diminish it. The 2017 Knights won more games than any Mac team before it; they were the first to advance to the state semifinals: "The memories you make last a lifetime," senior quarterback Max Perez said. "This team, this season, has been the highlight of my life so far."
