

BAKING UP A Storm

nutrition students mix, measure and master the art of perfect cookies

Ingredients

- 4 cups sugar
- 1/2 cup butter (1 stick)
- 1 egg
- 1 1/2 cups flour
- 1/2 tsp. baking soda
- 1/2 tsp. vanilla extract
- 1/3 cups sprinkles

1 Heat oven to 400°F. Line baking sheets with parchment paper.

2 Combine sugar, butter and egg in electric mixing bowl. Beat at medium speed scraping bowl often with a rubber spatula, until well mixed.

3 Add the flour, baking soda and vanilla extract; beat at low speed, scraping bowl often with a rubber spatula, until well mixed.

4 Using 2 spoons, scoop a small amount of dough (ball shape no larger than 1 inch) and roll one side in the sprinkles. Place, 2 inches apart, sprinkle side up, on cookie sheets.

5 Flatten the cookie slightly with the bottom of a custard dish or spoon. Bake for eight minutes or until edges are lightly browned.

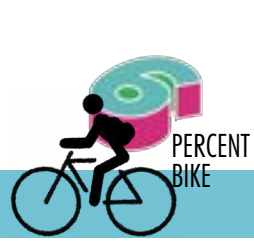
"I like taking my car because I enjoy driving and I have more freedom with what time I want to leave. I have to pay for gas, and go through traffic though." TYLER BLACK (12)
