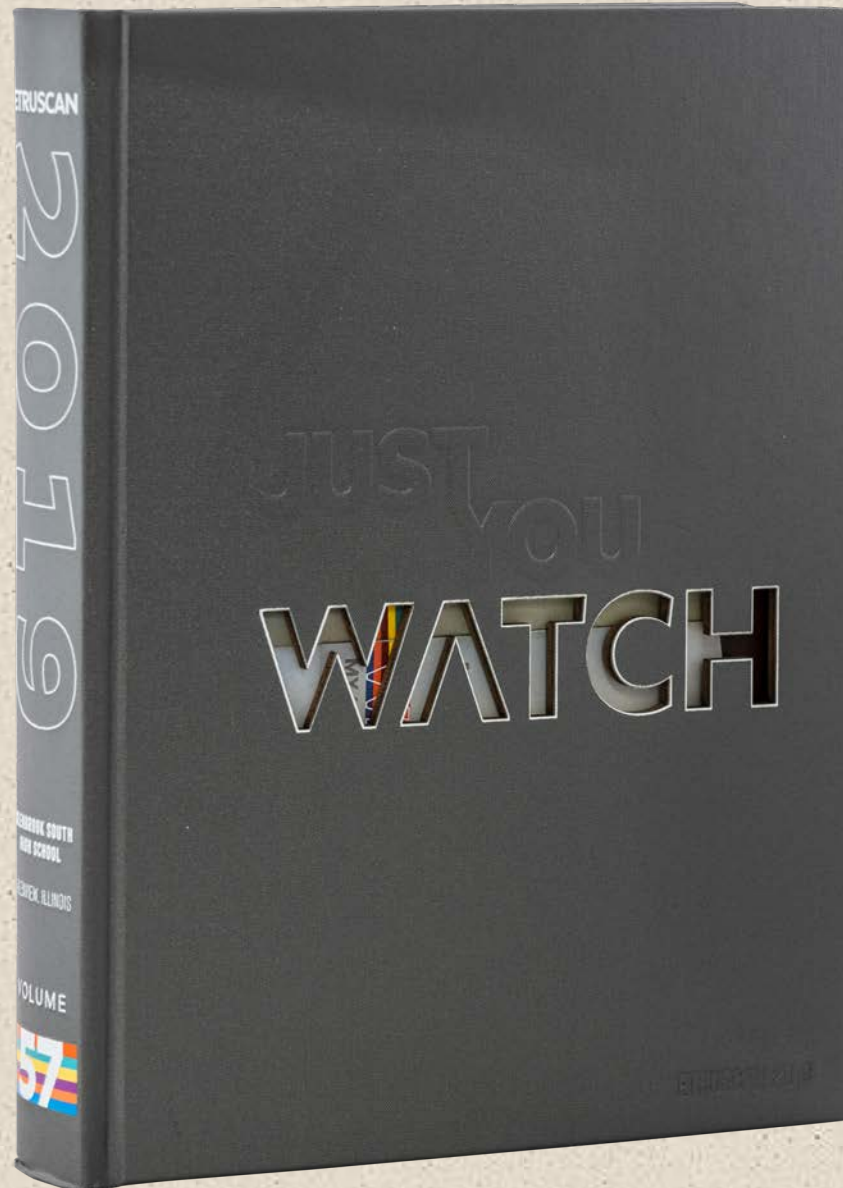

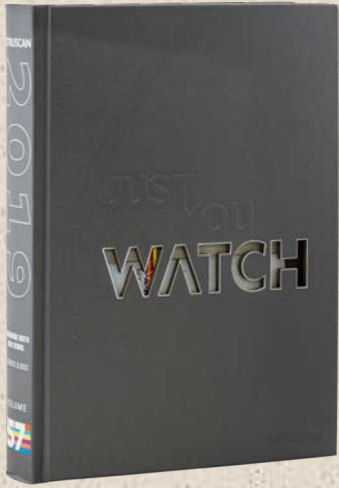

// Strong feature stories and showstopper spreads break up traditional coverage, and the unique tip-in was purposeful and fun to enhance the theme.

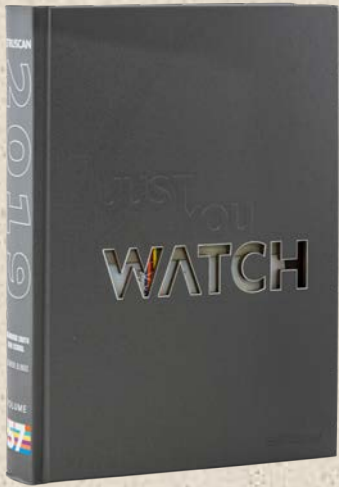

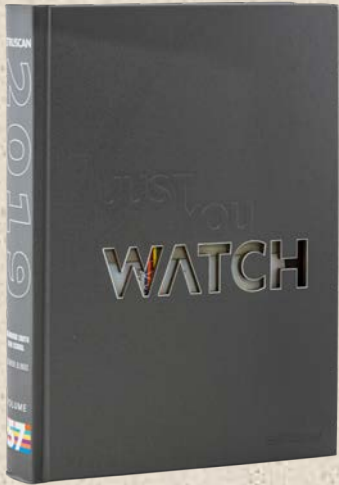

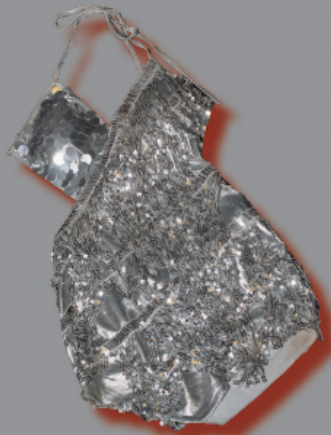

Huddled on the side of the dome bleachers, the members of De La Cru cheered "1-4-3, CRU," their traditional pump-up chant meaning "I love you." Together, the dancers sprinted out onto the gym floor beneath the purple and blue lights as the audience yelled, "De La Cru." They stood side-by-side in a semicircle in front of the stage and waited for the music to begin.

De La Cru started their practices for the Pep Rally performance just after the Fall Sports Assembly, so they only had a week to learn the dance. De La Cru completed their routine by practicing after school Monday through Thursday. Senior Kendal Daul said that the pressure to create a strong dance in a short amount of time helped the team grow closer.

more energetic and trying to put their best performance because it's such a big deal."

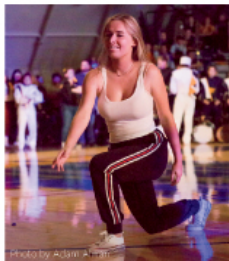

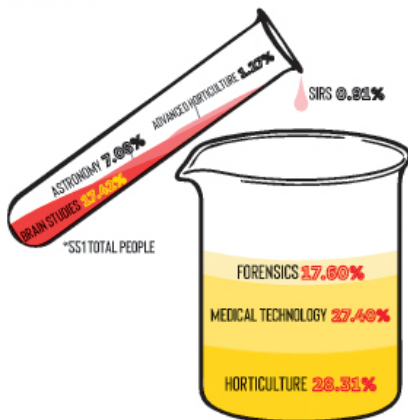

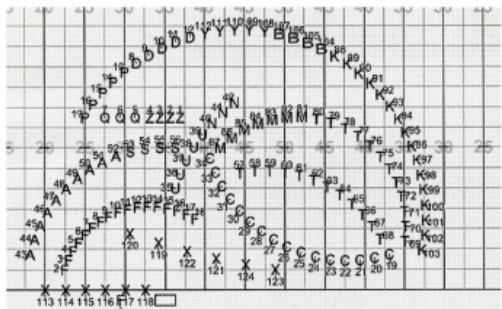

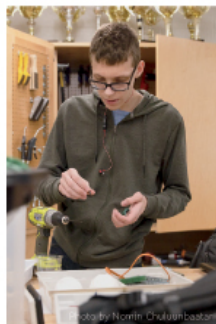

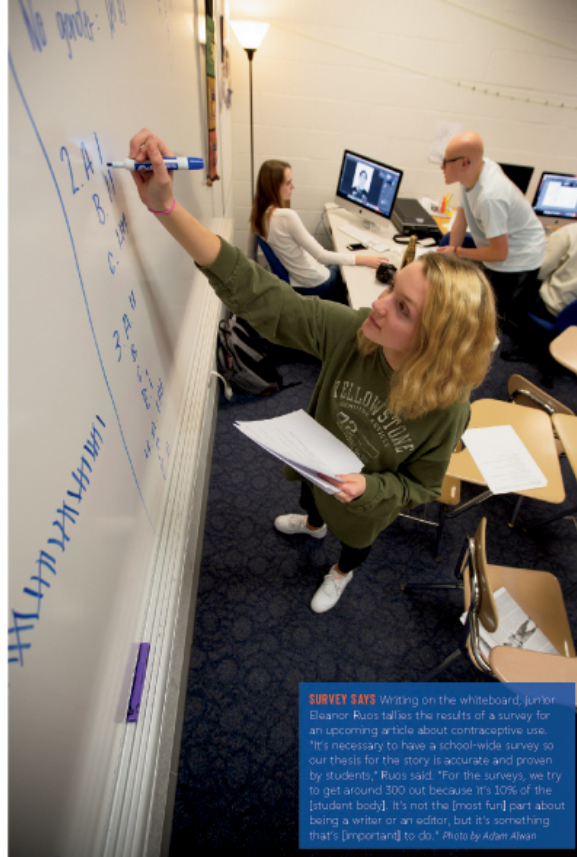

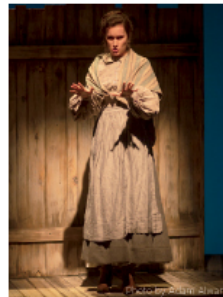
While actors were singing beneath the stage, others were waiting for their cue in the wings. Senior Joseph Rigney and freshman Gregson Neppi stood

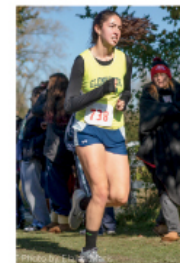

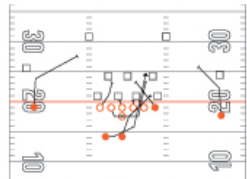

# GETTING INTO CHARACTER

CAST OF MARVIN'S ROOM  
FOCUSSES ON CHARACTER  
BUILDING DURING WINTER PLAY

Chairs lining the floor lit up as a spotlight focused on a table in the center of the set. The play, *Marvin's Room*, began with the main character Bessie, played by junior Allison Vogelmeier, and a doctor, played by senior Anish Abeysiriwardena, gathered around the doctor's table. Immediately following this scene, the audience meets Aunt Ruth, played by sophomore Violet Guzman-Robles, a bubbly yet forgetful woman.

"*Marvin's Room*" is a play about a family struggling with cancer and mental health. Being diagnosed with leukemia, Bessie is in need of a bone marrow transplant from a family member. Aunt Ruth became important in Bessie's life, advising her through her journey. Due to this, Guzman-Robles said becoming Aunt Ruth was no easy task.

"I had a tough time knowing my character because she's very different from me," Guzman Robles said. "She has a lot of faith, and I

don't necessarily. Because she was so different, I spent extra time reading her character. I really tried to find her on my own."

**Gathered in the kitchen**, the family stood around the counter and discussed the possibility of someone donating bone marrow to Bessie. Hank, the oldest son, played by freshman Vincent Hackl, was reluctant to help, and was reprimanded by his mother Lee, played by freshman Sloan Greenfield.

Due to Hank's anger management, he would not agree to help his aunt. Although Hank was a hostile character, Hackl said he does not feel the same about himself.

"The hardest part was understanding how Hank would react and behave around the other characters," Hackl said. "[Hank] got angry a lot, so I would try to get angry in my head so I could encompass what it's like to be angry. I think about things that happened to me that made me angry."

Later in the day, Hank and his little brother Charlie, played by freshman Braeden Lawler, laid down in sleeping bags outside. The lights illuminated the boys as they discussed if they should run away to avoid being pressured into donating bone marrow.

**At the end of the play**, Bessie comes to terms with her terminal illness and spends her last moments with her family. Her cancer brought the family closer, including Charlie. Charlie was a curious kid who loved to read, but Lawler said he was not able to relate to these traits and struggled to figure out his character.

"[Performing] the emotional part was difficult because I don't have that many lines to figure out my character," Lawler said. "I got to know my character with a lot of practice and thinking about how I would react. I would have never done this if I never had the opportunity; be open to different things, even though you might not like it at first."

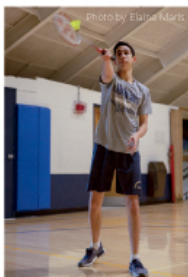

Standing before the judge, junior Alexander Baime took a deep breath and began his speech. Baime paused in the midst of his speech and looked to his partner, senior Anthony Valiaevdu, for assistance.

On Friday, Feb. 1, beginning at 5:00 p.m., 87 varsity policy debate partnerships participated in the preliminary two rounds of the tournament at Evanston Township against 28 high schools in the Midwest. On Saturday, Feb. 2, the debaters participated in rounds three through the octafinals, the round before the quarter finals.

**During the third round,** Baime and Valiaevdu were assigned the affirmative side, meaning they give the first speech of the round. A crucial part in their performance is their dynamic. Baime said he and his partner rely on each other throughout the year.

"They're your partners for the whole year," Baime said. "We both have the same mindset, and we want to work hard to win. Not only do we not want

to let ourselves down, but we also don't want to let the other person down. If I'm struggling to remember what I have to say, my partner can help me."

**On Saturday afternoon,** before the fifth round against Glenbrook North, junior Daria Kosack and senior Kelly Skoulkaris sat in a classroom discussing this year's overarching topic: immigration. They hunched over a wooden table, documents spread across the surface. The two wrote down notes and turned to their computers to review their speech.

Although they lost the round, Skoulkaris said the communication between the pair played an integral role. Skoulkaris said she takes advantage of the time between debates to discuss her argument and strategies.

"The more time I spend talking to my partner, the more I feel prepared," Skoulkaris said. "[The coaches] try to make partnerships whose personalities match. I'm a competitive person; my partner really cares about debate and winning as much as I do."

At 4:00 p.m. on Saturday, during the sixth round, sophomore George Boundroukas jotted down a note. He sent his partner, sophomore Logan Dickinson, a nod indicating that they both understood their arguments.

Boundroukas and Dickinson didn't make it to the final rounds, but Boundroukas said they developed arguments that could be useful in the future. The tournament ended on Sunday, Feb. 3, when the finals took place. Despite losing the fifth round, Skoulkaris and Kosack progressed to the octafinals and were the only pair from GBS to compete on Sunday. They tied for third place during the semifinals. All in all, Boundroukas said he felt proud of the whole team's accomplishments.

**I rely on my partner** to be aware and attentive of what argument we're going to read," Boundroukas said. "I can only put in half of the work; he needs to put in the other half. We feel like we could have won some, and we had a chance to lose some."

# HISTORY IN THE MAKING

**NEW AMERICAN EXPERIENCE CLASS OFFERED TO JUNIORS DIFFERS FROM COURSES PREVIOUSLY TAKEN**

Taught by one English teacher and one history teacher, American Experience combines English and US history to gain a deeper understanding of American culture.

"It's the only class in high school I've had [that meets] every day. The class is based on historical texts that teach us about American history. Even though it meets every day, all the assignments for English and history are piled into one class. 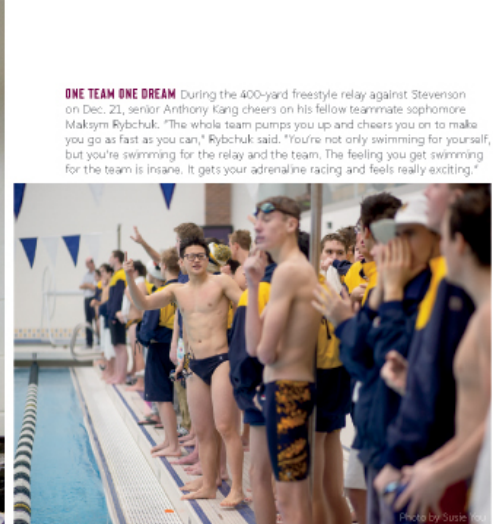

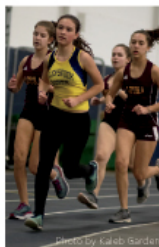

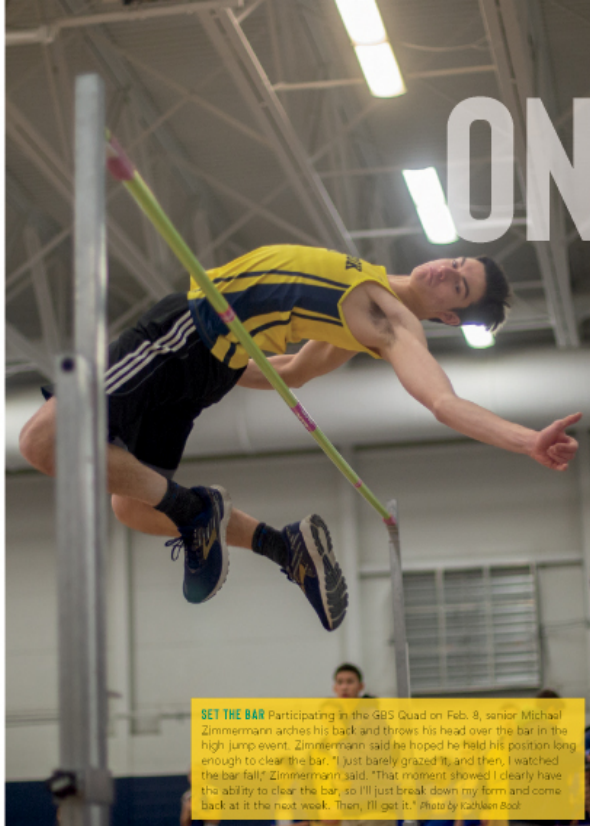

**M**y adoption was unique. I was adopted by my aunt and uncle while living in Taiwan due to my biological parents' financial issues. During the adoption process, my aunt, uncle and I had to go through multiple obstacles. In America, I attended preschool and elementary school. After a few years of school, I had to move back to Taiwan due to immigration issues. In Taiwan, I faced my first language obstacle. I had a limited Chinese vocabulary because of the time I had spent in America. When the adoption process started again, it was time for me to move back to America.

When I finally moved back, the process of learning a new language and culture resurfaced. It was difficult to adjust to my new environment because most of the students in the Chinese Catholic School I attended had strong English skills and sub-par Chinese. Throughout the years after my move, I slowly regressed the English language and immersed myself into my environment. Learning English allowed me to communicate more fluently with my peers. When I began to feel more comfortable communicating, it opened up new doors for friendships.

I feel extremely fortunate for the opportunities my aunt and uncle have given me in the United States. I learned from them that if you want something, you have to work for it before you can achieve it.

# FRAME OF MIND

SENIOR VICTORIA VIERRA RECOUNTS HER EXPERIENCE WITH DEPRESSION

Stupid, fake, get over it.

All these were things senior Victoria Vierra had heard before in fights with her sister and friends. Every comment worsened the depression she had been experiencing since eighth grade, even if the person did not intend to hurt her.

One of the most impactful fights with her friends happened sophomore year. Vierra said she doesn't even remember what the fight was about now, but at the time she felt upset because she cared deeply about others' opinions of her.

"[The fight] was everyone against me, from my point of view at the time," Vierra said. "Now it would have been different - I don't blame any of my friends [for the fight]. But for who I was and [from] the state of mind [I was in], it looked like I was completely alone."

Vierra called her mom in tears and said she wanted to leave school and go home. A couple of days later,

her mom questioned her mindset because she was concerned about Vierra's emotional stability. During the conversation with her mom, Vierra said she didn't have a reason to live. Her mom then took her to a hospital, alarmed by her negative thoughts.

The doctors at the hospital advised Vierra to sign up for therapy. At her Thursday sessions, she would discuss what had upset her that day. But even as the sessions came to an end, she still had more to say.

"I remember thinking no one really does care. I questioned who would notice [me]. It seemed like no one would. People would say things I know they wouldn't have meant, but there were times where it felt like they did mean it."

Therapy eventually helped Vierra to discover how much she enjoyed being outside. Whenever she felt sad, she started going outside instead of staying in her room. Sitting on her porch, walking around the neighborhood park and driving to the beach

helped her relax. When she felt the wind on her face, she said she felt freer because she didn't have to worry about anything.

Her breakthrough came at what would become one of her final sessions, when her therapist asked how she had changed. Vierra said she realized how much better she felt in that moment. By experiencing life outside, Vierra discovered that she regretted not going out more often in the past. Now, she said she sees the pointlessness of the high school fights that used to upset her.

"I realized the better place I was in and how much happier I was. I [turned into this] bright person [who] always tried to get people encouraged. Being outside really helped. Camp SOAR is an overnight camp for kids who have profound disabilities. Camp is a place where everybody can be equal. I have been a counselor at camp for the past three summers.

For one week, each counselor is responsible for one camper, day and night. We do fun activities that you would see at any camp. We watch performances, play sports and get to know each other.

As I go back each summer, I am trusted with campers who need more attention. My second week this summer, the girl I was working with was nonverbal, she couldn't walk, she couldn't understand. It was hard to build a relationship at first, but we bonded and she giggled and was always happy so it was a good time. I thought it would be hard to connect with my campers, but I can honestly say I became so close with all six of the campers I've had so far, regardless of their abilities.

Camp is a huge responsibility and it has helped me to become more patient and flexible. No matter how stressful or challenging the week is, I never had any complaints. Camp has changed my perspective, and has allowed me to see that people with disabilities should not be treated differently. They're capable of all of the same things that I am capable of. Yes, sometimes certain tasks are challenging for them, but they work twice as hard to adapt. People need to learn that instead of trying to make others adapt to what works best for them, they need to learn to adapt to make others feel comfortable.

Merchant, as described by his friends and teachers, was outgoing, compassionate and hard-working. Throughout his four years at South, Merchant was involved in the TLS Program, Circle of Friends, Peer Mentors and participated in the TLS basketball games. When he was not doing schoolwork, he was often found either spending time with his friends and family or watching his favorite TV show, *Spongebob Squarepants*.

After meeting one another sophomore year, senior Elizabeth Bergin became both a friend and mentor to Merchant. The two shared several classes and also participated in clubs and activities together. One of Bergin's favorite qualities of Merchant was his kind and charismatic character.

"He was always looking out for other people [and] making sure they were okay [because] he genuinely cared about everyone," Bergin said. "He liked talking to people and socializing - he was a cheerleader for everyone. He was always laughing and would crack jokes. The students in his class loved him; everyone around him loved him."

Ms. Kelly Derrig, Merchant's teacher for over a year, said he always walked through the halls with a smile on his face, greeting as many people as he could. Derrig also said Merchant was very humorous, as he constantly tried to make light of every situation.

"[Merchant] was really good at one-liners," Derrig said. "He would say a one-liner in a moment you weren't expecting it [and] you [would] just start laughing. He always told it like it was, whether it was to the teacher or the student. He always brought the humor, even

on days when he wasn't the happiest or the most positive."

Derrig said Merchant managed to maintain his humor and positive mindset even in the face of adversity. Because of Merchant, Derrig said she tries to slow down throughout the day to find the little yet important moments of joy—moments so often overlooked when caught in the heat of things.

"Every student has their own struggles [and] barriers that make school difficult," Derrig said. "Ali had things unique to him, but you wouldn't know it. I have never met a student that despite having to overcome [challenges], stayed [so] positive [and] worked hard. He was happy to wake up every day and happy to be here."

# DESTINED TO DANCE

SENIOR MAJA MARKOVIC PERFORMS SERBIAN DANCES TO EMBRACE HER HERITAGE

It was the moment professional Serbian dancer senior Maja Markovic had been waiting for. The moment she would take the stage to perform the upbeat dance, "Igre iz crne trave," in Canada which she had been rehearsing for four months in front of her mirror to perfect.

The traditional Serbian performance began when the female dancers lightly tapped their feet to the music. The dance is a Serbian folk tale about a harvest. The men soon entered the stage to the beat of a drum as the women waited in anticipation for their announcement about the fall harvest.

"When I dance, I want to be perfect," Markovic said. "I remember going on stage and telling myself Maja, 'You got this.' I got on that stage and my composure was excellent. At the beginning of our dance, I remember seeing people talking, [but] as the song progressed, I saw the people stop talking and watch me dance."

The men then announced to the women that the harvesting of grains was successful. The dancers smiled and laughed depicting the traditional story of the grain that would bring prosperity even in winter.

The hard work Markovic puts into her dances is rooted in her desire to embrace her Serbian culture. She said every step she dances brings her closer to her culture.

As Markovic dances, she said she brings Serbian customs to life with her facial expressions, rhythm and korak (intricate footwork). Markovic said that because her culture is important to her, having her hard work recognized was rewarding.

"I remember looking out at the audience and seeing the most people ever stand up and clap and I was taken aback. It was amazing because it was the first time that I [felt] all my work had culminated."

She recalled her grandparents' eyes filled with

tears watching her dance. When Markovic dances, she said she is able to understand and feel the emotions her grandparents and her country have experienced.

Markovic said she wanted to make her grandparents proud because she understands how much they sacrificed coming to the United States from a war-torn country. For her, dancing is a way to give back to her grandparents and embrace her heritage.

"Through my dances I pick up on small things about family, about love, about sadness [and] about faith. It's important to participate to some extent [in your culture] because you will learn a lot of important values that are relevant to your life and that will help you make decisions as you go to college, find your career and start a family."

## PITCH PERFECT

SENIOR JACK SUNDSTROM'S PASSION FOR MUSIC SHAPES HIS LIFE

**T**he twang of the guitar permeated the air surrounding the stage. At the very front of the crowd stood a little boy with shiny eyes, watching his dad's fingers as they methodically brushed the strings.

Senior Jack Sundstrom has grown up in a musically talented family. Sundstrom said he particularly enjoyed the energetic atmosphere at his dad's Irish band concerts. He spent many nights watching his dad perform and listening to his music.

"Pretty much from the day I was born there was always music on and I loved it," Sundstrom said. "I would go see my dad's band and I thought it was the coolest thing in the world. Music is an opportunity to be with people. Playing music for an audience... is just this interesting, communicative [and] emotional experience; there's this exchange

between [the musician] and the people."

Sundstrom's dad presented his son with his first instrument when he was four years old. "Here's a drum; you hit this," he said. As he concealed a smile, Sundstrom picked up the sticks and measured their weight in his hands. He swung at the drum and sound rang out.

Developing the perfect sound, however, took time, Sundstrom said. Learning to play the drums came with more setbacks than successes, but Sundstrom said his troubles were well worth the satisfaction he gained when he finally got the hang of drumming.

"I've definitely learned from music that not everything's gonna come to you right away; you have to work for things in life. If I want to learn to play [a new instrument], I'm probably not gonna be able to do it right away; I need to work at that. It takes time, and when you

get it right, it feels good; that's the reason I would say it's worth learning to play."

After years of practicing without an audience, Sundstrom was finally ready to execute his first performance. Sundstrom took a deep breath and began to play. Suddenly, music filled the room and Sundstrom's nerves disappeared.

Sundstrom said that while performing is very enjoyable, it at first was very nerve-racking for him. However, he says, as time went on and he began to perform with more frequency, playing in front of an audience began to get easier.

"When you go to perform, you just forget [everything] and let your brain take over. One thing that most musicians will tell you [is] you don't really think when you're performing. If you're doing a good job, you're not thinking. Music is happening around you and you're creating."

LIVING IN SEVERAL COUNTRIES OFFERS JUNIOR HAYLEY MANNING WORLDLY PERSPECTIVE

A five-year-old girl sat up in her plane seat and rubbed her eyes. Unbuckling her seat belt, she grabbed her backpack and dragged it down the plane aisle toward her new home.

Junior Hayley Manning has moved six times in her life. Her first moves happened early. Manning was born in Russia and adopted by a family in Canada. At four, she moved from Canada to Illinois, only to move to Russia a year later. Then, when Manning was ten, she moved to Indonesia.

"My dad's job moves him around a lot because he's pretty high up in the company," Manning said. "He got promoted to other areas, so we were posted in

southeast Asia for a while. When I was younger, it didn't really phase me. Moving to a new country became the habit. But, as I got older, I just wanted to stay where we were."

At age 12, Manning moved overseas once again, this time from Indonesia to Singapore. With tears in her eyes, Manning gave her friends a final hug goodbye. Pulling her suitcase, Manning walked through the airport doors.

Manning started a new life, made friends and grew accustomed to a new environment. Two years later, just as she was beginning to feel comfortable, Manning had to leave Singapore for a new home.

"You live somewhere for a few years, get into the routine of things and make friends. You then have to leave your old life behind, move to a new hemisphere and get used to what's socially and culturally

acceptable there. I've never really been able to have somewhere I call home."

The same cycle—now a routine—repeated. A flight attendant's voice crackled over the intercom, this time announcing the plane was touching down in Chicago. Stepping onto the ramp, Manning pulled her suitcase along once more. She was ready to begin a new life in Glenview.

Manning said her dynamic lifestyle provides her with a worldly perspective that she could not have gained anywhere else. It has become something Manning said she is used to and has learned a lot from.

"Most people have lived here their entire lives and they've only experienced one kind of culture. I've had to move to so many different [places]. I [want to] keep moving around now; it feels normal to me. I feel like the world is my home."

McNabola, as remembered by his peers and teachers, had an infectious laugh, a charming smile and persistent optimism that defined his character. He was a dedicated member of the community through his involvement in Young Life, Key Club and the lacrosse team.

Steven Weissenstein, McNabola's business law and accounting teacher, said McNabola always came to class with a positive attitude that filled the classroom with optimism. Weissenstein said McNabola's friendly personality drew many peers and teachers to him.

"Matt had this magnetism that just drew you to him," Weissenstein said. "He always had a smile on his face. I don't think he knew the kids

around him, but he became quick friends with them because he's such a positive kid. He could make friends with anybody because he had this aura about him; everybody liked him and it was like he never had a bad day. Sometimes kids have bad days and they're frowning, [but] Matt never [showed] that he was down. He was really a great people person."

Weissenstein said McNabola's presence always brightened up the classroom environment. Weissenstein said his sense of humor and willingness to participate in class created a more comfortable and enjoyable environment for everyone around him.

"Let's pretend I say a stupid corny joke," Weissenstein said. "I'd have my back to the class and there was one kid laughing: Matt. He had a great temperament about him.

He was always willing to participate during our class discussions; he's one of those kids that influenced others to participate."

Senior Jacob Snyder, a friend of McNabola's through Young Life, recalls McNabola as always amiable and sympathetic to his classmates. Snyder said he remembers McNabola for his caring personality.

"Matt was such a kind-hearted person," Snyder said. "Everything he did [had] pure intentions and he would always share super insightful things. He was such a nice person; he always went out of his way to make your day better and I think that was really special about him. He never expected anything in return; [McNabola] just did everything out of the kindness of his heart."

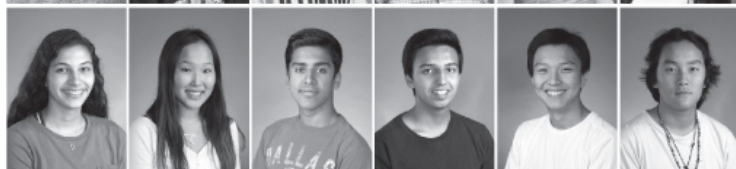

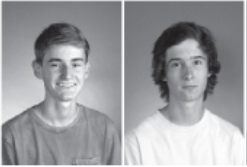
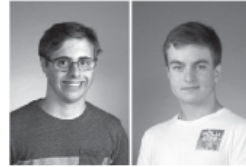

# BORN TO FLY

JUNIOR PHILLIP NORTON PURSUES PASSION TO PILOT

From flying toy planes around the house to flying real planes across the sky, Junior Phillip Norton found his passion early in life. At age 15, Norton said he had already made part of his childhood dream come true—piloting an aircraft by himself.

Norton's journey, however, began before he decided he actually wanted to fly. He said as a kid everything about planes intrigued him.

"I've always loved planes," Norton said. "Since forever, I've had toy planes and Lego planes, and I haven't been able to distance myself from planes ever since."

It wasn't until age 14 that Norton's fascination for planes lead him to the cockpit. He convinced his parents to register him for the Johnson Flight Academy,

one of the summer camps the Civil Air Patrol provides to train toward a FAA Private Pilot license. At the camp, Norton piloted a glider for the first time.

Norton said this experience was one he would remember for many years to come. Although he was slightly nervous, Norton said his instructor guided him through the process.

"I got in a glider and we were hooked up to an airplane in front of us. The airplane started going and we took off after it. It was a very real experience for me because part of my dreams came true. It was amazing."

At age 16 and after years of practice, Norton was able to obtain his Private Pilot-Glider certificate, allowing him to fly almost all gliders solo. Norton said getting this certificate was a prominent milestone in his life.



Norton flies by himself around once a month on the weekends at an airport in Hampshire, Illinois. He is a member of the Sky Soaring Glider Club at this airport. Norton said the majority of the pilots there are retired and he appreciates the knowledge he receives from more experienced pilots. Norton said he does not see himself losing his passion anytime soon. He hopes to one day be a commercial airline pilot and serve in the United States Air Force.

"There's a sense of freedom that is connected to flying and it's hard to get away from that freedom. You can decide where to go and what to do. There doesn't have to be any plan for the day, you can just go flying and end up wherever."

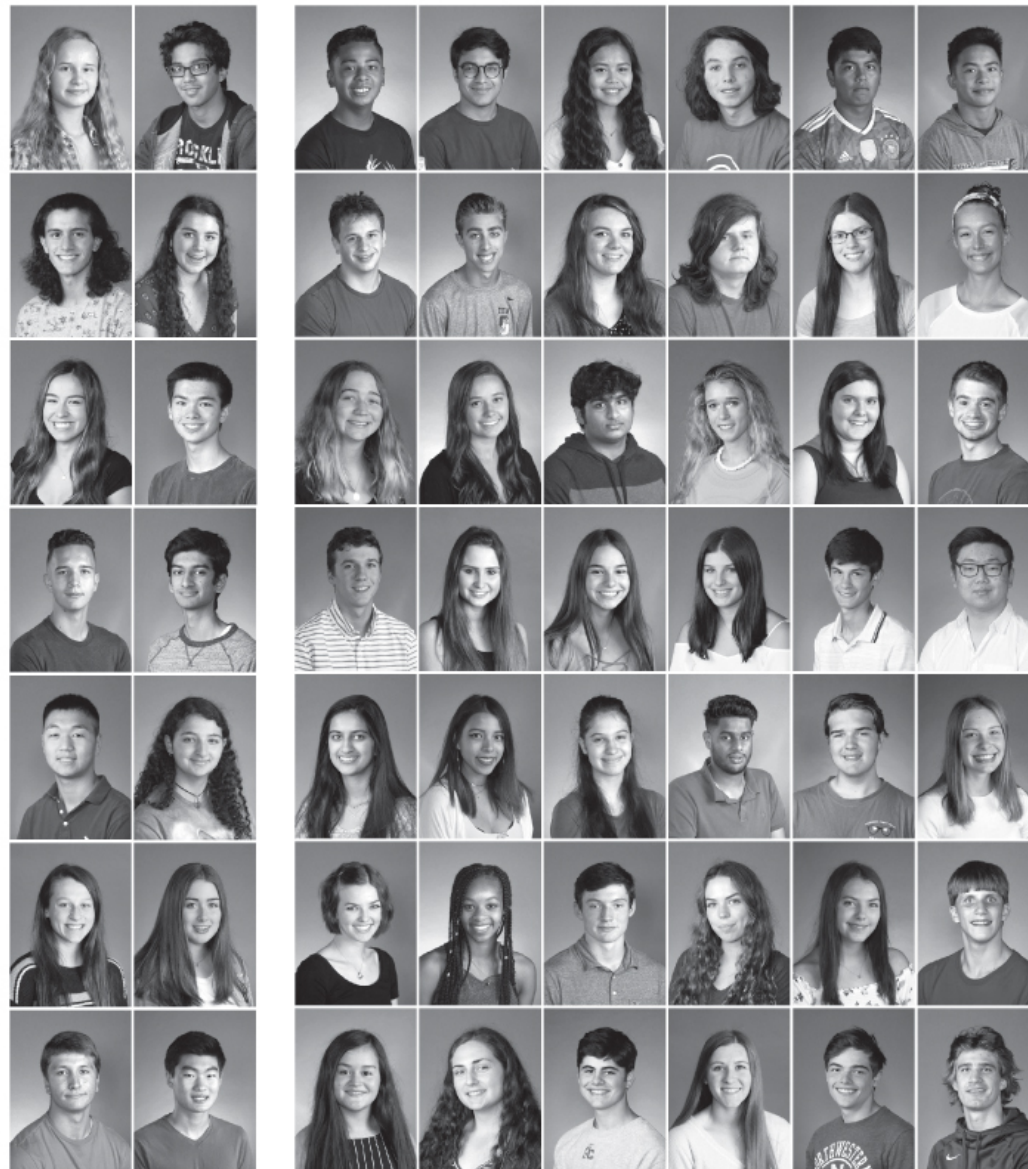

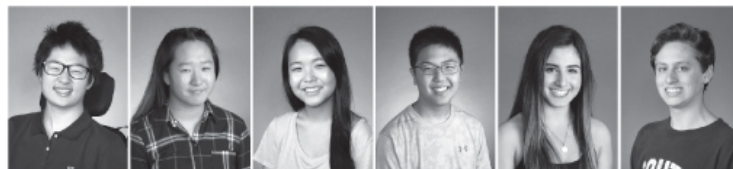

## BORN TO CONNECT

SOPHOMORE GABRIEL KARDAS GAINS NEW UNDERSTANDING OF CONNECTIONS AFTER PASSING OF BABY SISTER

he was small, about half the length of his arm. Then 13, sophomore Gabriel Kardas peered down at his baby sister. He had never held a newborn baby before. Her little hands couldn't even wrap around one of his fingers. Kardas said his mother was crying with joy, but simultaneously stressing out because she couldn't decide on a name. Then it came to her: Nicole.

Shortly after her birth, the doctors told the family they needed to run some tests because Nicole was frail and discolored due to her premature birth.

"It's a weird feeling because it seems like everything is really quiet, quiet to the point that it's loud," Kardas said. "You're stuck in a moment, a series of mixed feelings. I went from being super happy about having a sister to then realizing that I might not have a sister anymore."

The doctors said she would not make it. Nicole passed about six hours after her birth. Kardas locked himself in his room for weeks. His family ate dinner separately, and conversation was scarce. Kardas said his family was walking on eggshells around the topic of Nicole's passing. Any mention of her would lead to a heavy silence.

"It was really hard. I wouldn't meet up with friends or anything. I wanted to be in bed and sleep most of the time. My mom didn't talk that much for a long time. You can't go back to normal after something like that; we were just trying to do our best to cope with what happened."

Two weeks went by with little change. Kardas mostly stayed shut in his

room. But one day, he told himself it was time to leave the confining walls of his bedroom behind. He told himself that it was important to emerge from the hole he had fallen into.

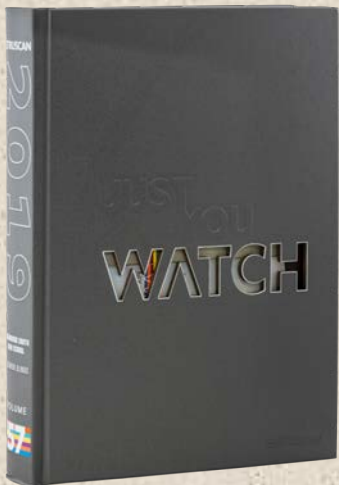
He started by walking around his house and initiating more conversations with his family members. He convinced his mom to start sharing her feelings. With time, the sounds of family and friends filled his house again.

"The moment you decide it's okay to get up, it will benefit you. It makes you feel a lot better. What I went through during that time has made me the person I am today. You feel this connection [to people] because you know that there is a connection that you lost. You feel the need to have as many relationships as you can and strengthen them."

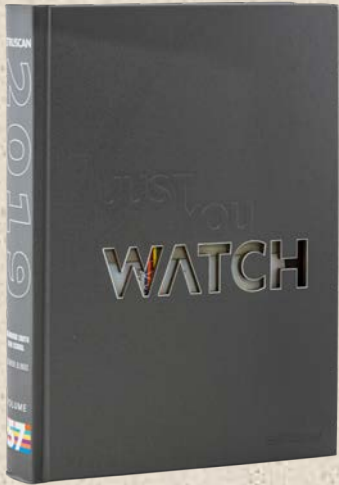

**M**y life is a messy story. My childhood consisted of fighting, overdosing and cops coming to my house because my siblings were involved in illegal activities. No one in my family paid attention to me because everyone's focus was on my siblings.

Things escalated when my brothers became addicted to heroin. They were in and out of jail and rehab.

Despite this, I love all my siblings equally, but Lucky was special to me. When no one was there, Lucky was. We worked out and watched movies. It broke my heart seeing Lucky like this.

Lucky developed a heart condition from his addiction that needed surgery. The doctors said the chances of him making it out were slim. Lucky was lucky though; rules didn't apply to him. He fought for his life for five months. He wasn't able to eat or breathe on his own.

On May 1, Lucky was released from the hospital. We were so happy. But within that first week, he got his hands on heroin. On May 9, my dad found Lucky; he had overdosed.

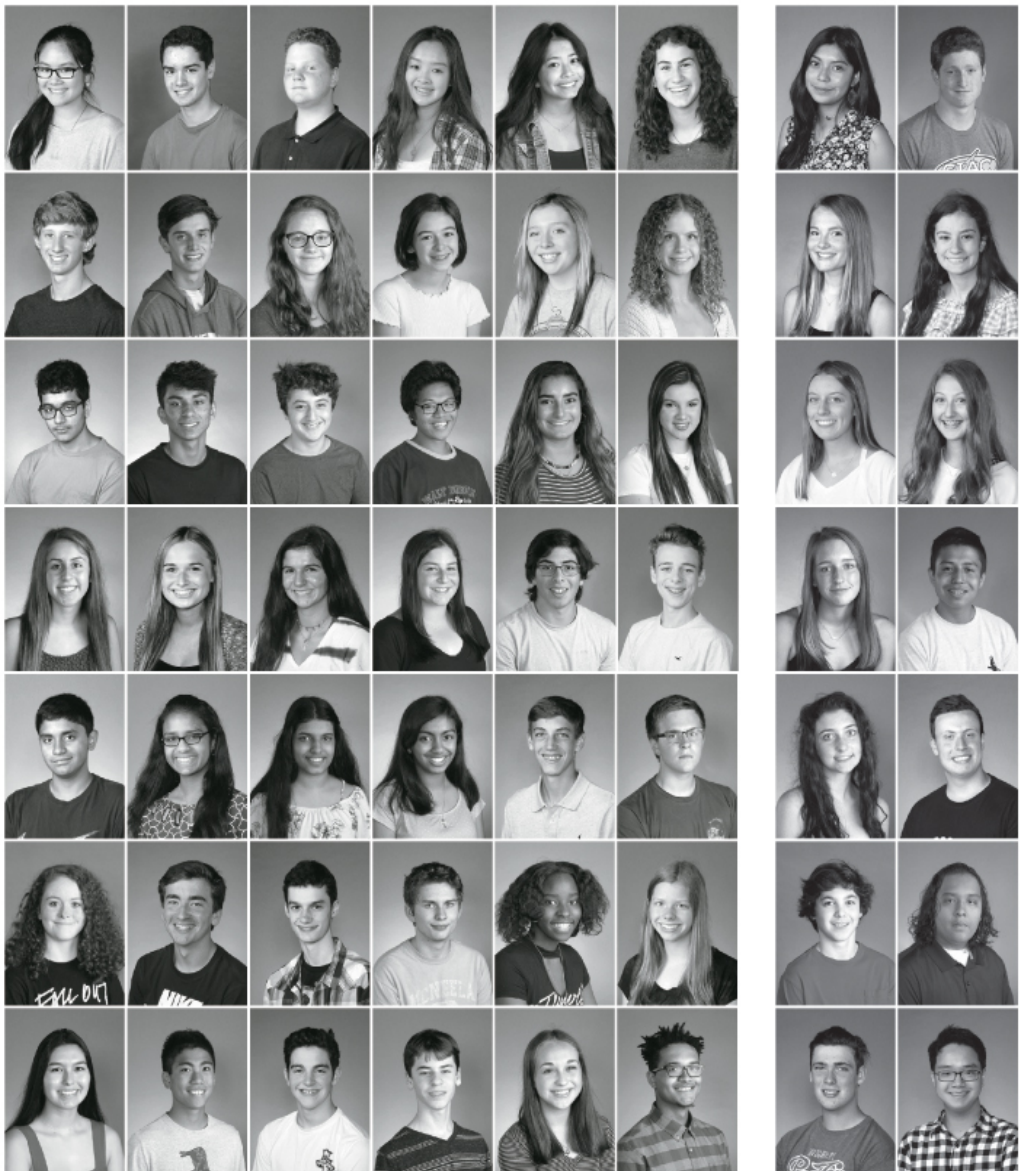

**THROUGH IT ALL**

**SOPHOMORE CAITLYN GIERTZ WORKS TO IMPROVE MENTAL HEALTH  
 AFTER TRAUMATIC CHILDHOOD** *BY CAITLIN NOE AND ENJI ERDENKHUYAO*

"If my family were walking in public, you would just think we [were] a normal family," sophomore Caitlyn Giertz said.

But behind closed doors, Giertz said it was a different story. Her parents fought any time of the day and without warning. Yelling, fighting and objects flying through the air were common occurrences.

At a young age, Giertz said she did not comprehend the severity of her situation because she had never known any different than the abuse she and her mother endured.

"When I was younger, I thought, 'Oh they are just bickering, it's no big deal; everybody fights.' But when I was about seven, they would become increasingly violent. It was only until we got out of the situation that I discovered the extent of everything."

The situation escalated to the point where Giertz's mother called the police. Giertz's father served time

in jail and was not permitted to see her or her mother for three months. Giertz's parents are currently in the process of getting a divorce. She lives with her mom and visits her dad once or twice a month under specified legal conditions.

Giertz's childhood trauma remains with her. She said she suffers from feelings of low self-worth and anxiety. Currently in therapy, Giertz said she has learned the importance of having a positive outlook and seeking help.

"I'm trying to get off of putting myself down. I have gotten a lot better, but it's hard. For a while, I wouldn't seek help, but now, I've become willing to reach out. You need to open up, even if you feel mad or sad about doing it. You got to let someone know."

Giertz wakes up to her favorite artists Pentatonix, Panic at the Disco and Fall Out Boy every morning; she said it excites her for the day ahead.

Giertz said she learned to have a new outlook on life

due to the help she received. She said she decided to share her story not for pity, but because she wants people to recognize others may be going through a similar situation. She wants people to be supported as she has been.

"I have learned to be nice to others [and] to stand up for myself. I hope people learn from this and take this as something that's still happening. If you get help, you will be better off in the long run. My advice is to tell someone. More than likely, they will be able to help you through it."

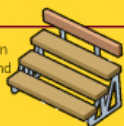

It was July 3, 2017, in Putnam, IL. I was swimming, celebrating the upcoming holiday at a lake house with the people I love the most. It was an amazing time, until one of my dad's friends hurried over yelling, "Olek, pośpiech!" telling me to come quickly. Once we got back to the lake house, I saw the ambulance. I ran downstairs and saw my dad, the only parent that I had left, on the floor, having a heart attack. I couldn't believe it; thoughts were just rushing through my head. My dad passed away shortly after in the hospital.

I had dealt with a loss like this earlier in life when my mother passed away from diabetes when I was four, but at fourteen, losing my dad was different. Growing up after my mother's death, my older sister and I gained an independence that we hadn't had before. The skills my sister and I gained through this helped us to get through the hard times after my dad's passing. My childhood was cut short after my father's passing; my sister and I had to learn to live on our own and take care of ourselves. On top of all of this, I had to deal with the grief.

You don't realize how much somebody really cares about you until they are gone. Parents devote their entire lives for the good of their kid, even though it sometimes may not seem like it. Parents have your back no matter what happens, but once they are gone, you are the one responsible for your own future. Even though a great loss like this is hard to deal with, it is always important to realize there's good that comes out of every bad.

"Freshman year of football, I **DISLOCATED MY SHOULDER** and went through physical therapy. The next year, as a sophomore, I had constant dislocations in my shoulder. From an MRI, I found out that I **TORE MY LABRUM AND WOULD NEED SURGERY**. I was in a sling for about two months. But, with the sling, my neck started hurting [because] one of the top vertebrae was out of place. All my life, **IT'S ALWAYS BEEN SPORTS**; it's what I use to relax. For a doctor to tell me that **I CAN'T DO IT ANYMORE** is really hard. I almost felt lost because I lost the one thing I would fall back on, but that I, I felt like I got **CLOSER WITH MY FRIENDS**, having more time to spend with them. I [also] got **INVOLVED IN GREEK CLUB**, along with Model UN. I love to be active; I love to be going somewhere."

ANTHONY TRAVLOS (10)

"Three years ago, I **BROUGHT MY DOG TO A TRAINING CLASS**. I met this trainer there and she **INVITED ME TO WORK WITH ONE OF HER FIRST RESCUE DOGS** [at] Redemption Road Rescue Inc. She told me the dog's story of how he lived in a garage for eight years and was never [let] out; it really hit me. He's such a sweet dog. I worked with him every weekend and **DOT HIM TO TRUST ME** and other people. We created a great bond that motivated me to help the other dogs that she [rescued]. I got involved after that, and I **STILL WORK WITH HER EVERY WEEK**. We work to get them rehabilitated, health-wise and behavior-wise, so we can put them into homes. A lot of stories you **HEAR ABOUT THESE DOGS BEING ABUSED**, they're not just stories; they're real life. People don't think [abuse] happens in the Glenview area, but it actually does. You could see a lot **DOGS THAT ARE MISTREATED** or left out. The only way to change it is if people take action against it."

"[My dad is] a **CHIEF PETTY OFFICER**; it's a recruitment officer in the US Navy. [The] first time I moved, I was 2. We moved from Wichita, Kansas to Oak Harbor, Washington. [We have] **MOVED ABOUT FIVE TIMES**. The hardest part is you make friends, and then a couple years later, you move again and have to **RESTART THE ENTIRE THING**. I usually start with people in my classes, and I go from there. I use music to cope. **I LIKE ROCK**, mostly early 2000s and 90s. I use music as a common ground with people. I use it to help make me happy and as a point of conversation when I make friends. I learned there is a lot of **UNIQUE PEOPLE**. It's definitely an experience moving around cause you meet a bunch of different people, and you get to learn about **DIFFERENT CULTURES**."

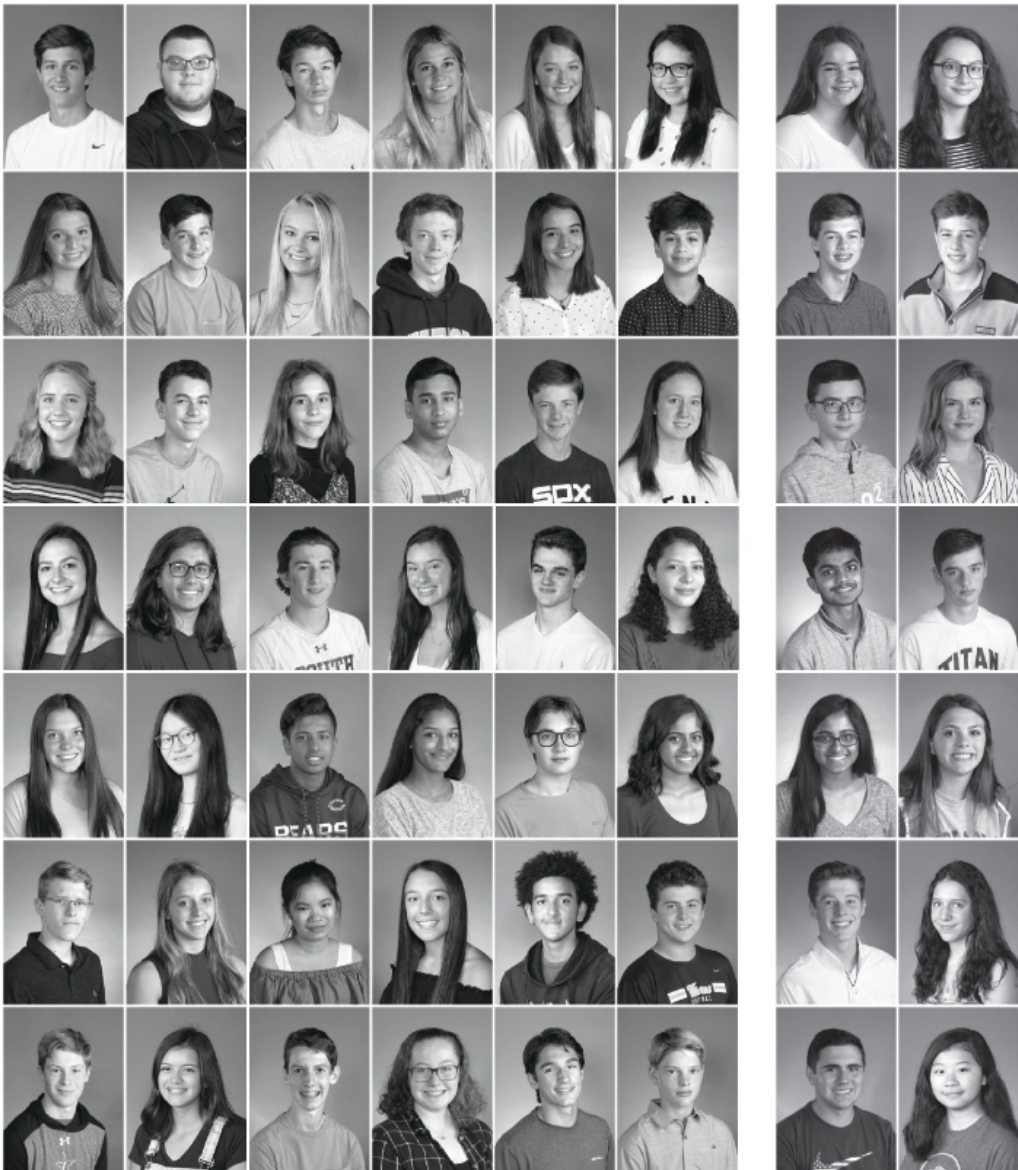

# PICKING POSITIVITY

DESPITE BATTLING CANCER, SOPHOMORE LUKE GREGORY MAINTAINS OPTIMISTIC OUTLOOK ON LIFE

**T**hirteen year old Luke Gregory found that he had a lump on the bottom of his left foot. He didn't think anything of it for several weeks, but before long, walking and running became a chore.

On Aug. 19, 2016, sophomore Gregory received a phone call that would lead to him being in and out of hospitals for the next year of his life.

Gregory was diagnosed with rhabdomyosarcoma, a type of cancer that develops in soft tissues. In his case, it developed in his left foot. Gregory said the process toward getting fully diagnosed was confusing due to the tests done and the constant moving between specialists.

"When I was diagnosed, I was still hoping it was a mistake," Gregory said. "There are always going to be those times that are hard

for everyone like of course, getting diagnosed. It was kind of good to know for sure what it was, to have nothing be unknown anymore."

With recurrent visits to the hospital, Gregory began his 54 week frontline protocol including 25 days at the hospital over five separate stays. Gregory endured several treatments of chemotherapy and radiation during his time there. Gregory said these treatments often involved physical side effects.

"[When I was] feeling nauseous a lot of the time, I got used to it and accepted that that's how it's going to be for a while. Some times are worse than others, but I've been able to handle it pretty well. You just understand that's what you have to do."

After a little over a year of battling cancer, Gregory is now in remission and has been for about a year. He has begun a new hobby:

track and field. He had always enjoyed running but said the cancer in his leg caused him pain and limited his ability to participate in the sport. When he joined the team, Gregory said his passion for the sport became much stronger.

Now that Gregory has undergone the severe portions of treating his cancer, he said he has been placed on a tamer maintenance procedure. Due to this, Gregory has more freedom to pursue track and field.

"I live my life pretty differently now. It's been a few years since I was diagnosed, [and] I think I just value each moment much more and think about what I want to do with my life more. I try not to do anything that isn't worth it or valuable. I try to have a purpose for everything I do."

# BUILD BIG

FRESHMAN CEO PARKER KREX CREATES LEGO COMPANY BRICK LOOT

The idea came to freshman Parker Krex when he was nine years old at his own garage sale, selling old toys to raise money for new Legos. During the garage sale, Krex received a Geek Gamer subscription box through the mail as a 10th birthday gift. When he peered down at the box, all he saw were superhero socks and an air freshener. That's when the idea came to him; Krex would create a subscription box with his favorite toy, Legos.

Krex created a startup company, Brick Loot. Brick Loot is now a fully functioning subscription service. Customers can sign up for different plans: one month, three months, six months or a year option. Every Brick Loot box comes with a Lego minifigure and sets to create different characters. Krex said the company started out small, just a few hundred boxes sold for the first month, but he said it grew very fast.

"At first, I didn't really think it was going to happen; it was more of just an idea in my head, and usually you don't go through with it," Krex said. "Then within a year or so, I was on Fox News Chicago, and they aired it four times in the day. People were like, 'Wait, you weren't kidding!'"

When Krex comes up with a new idea for a set, he emails one of his designers. Within a day, a new model is created. Krex picks out the parts for the model online, sees how much it costs and then orders the parts. When the parts arrive, the employees individually pack thousands of kits into boxes. Then, Brick Loot's shipping company sends out boxes to the customers.

Being the CEO of a company since the age of nine, Krex became accustomed to the many responsibilities of running a business. Krex researches, comes up with the ideas for his next set and packs his boxes for shipping.

"It's weird because most people don't get used to these experiences until they're 20. It's interesting to experience all that when you're 14. It's taught me a lot about responsibility."

Currently, Krex is working on upcoming boxes and has eight employees. Krex said the company's revenue in 2018 was two million dollars. They now have a store in the front area of their new warehouse in Deerfield, as well as a minifigure vault museum, which has over 3,000 unique Lego minifigures. Krex said that he'd like to grow Brick Loot and expand into other platforms to reach even more people.

"People should follow through with their ideas because everybody has at least one that they can turn into something big. You don't just think of an idea then let it sit in the back of your head; you should use those ideas. Don't give up."

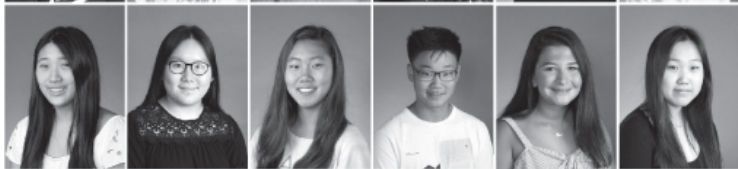

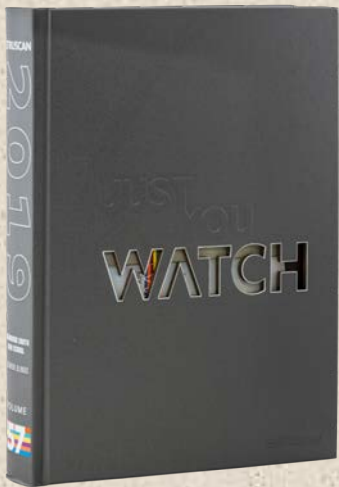

AFTER MOVING FROM MONGOLIA, FRESHMAN CHINKHUSLEN HANNAH MENDBAYAR OVERCOMES LANGUAGE BARRIER

She moved to a new school 6,246 miles from her home without knowing English. She left behind her childhood memories of adventures with friends and going to the countryside to visit her grandparents.

Freshman Chinkhuslen Hannah Mendbayar lived in Ulaanbaatar, Mongolia her whole life until she moved to Glenview, Illinois in eighth grade. She said having to adapt to a new school and make new friends without being able to communicate was a challenging experience.

"I didn't know anything about English or how to talk to people," Mendbayar said. "I had words to say, but I couldn't express myself. I was really nervous, and I got lost so many times; I was so afraid to ask for help."

Mendbayar met other Mongolian students that

helped her get to her classes and through the first days of school. Despite the language barrier, Mendbayar said school got easier and that her teachers were very welcoming. Once she had adjusted to her new middle school, she then transitioned into high school.

To connect with the American culture, Mendbayar listened to American songs while in Mongolia. The songs helped because she was able to pick up the new language and relate to American culture through the lyrics and melodies. Because of this, Mendbayar joined the freshman Glee Club choir as a soprano. She says that singing in the school choir allows her to practice English in an environment outside of the classroom with her peers.

"I didn't know English, but music was connecting me to this new environment. GBS choir is a really good community. The kids are

nice and the teachers are so talented. I joined choir so I had to communicate with others. It helped me with communicating with less nervousness."

Mendbayar also said the ELL program has helped her to speak English more coherently. Mendbayar said that her ELL teacher, Ms. Mina Moon, teaches her students one on one which enables Mendbayar to get personal attention to learn English at her own pace. According to Mendbayar, these supportive environments have alleviated some of her nerves.

"At first it was hard, but now it is getting easier. My teachers, my friends, my parents and environment have helped me. I feel really comfortable here. It is like my second home. The kids and the teachers [are] like my [family]."

# STRENGTH FROM STRUGGLE

INSTRUCTIONAL ASSISTANT MS. ELIZABETH NESTOS LEARNS TO DEPEND ON SELF  
 AFTER CHANGING RELATIONSHIPS

rowing up, Ms. Elizabeth Nestos said she never felt true freedom because of her parents' strict rules and her marriage. Nestos never had the opportunity to handle responsibilities on her own. Then, at age 29, after divorcing her husband, she became a single mother with three sons, ages one, three and four.

Nestos said the greatest challenge she faced after her divorce was juggling the care of her three sons. As a full-time mother, she drove her sons to Greek school, supported their baseball and basketball careers and took them to reading classes.

With her family living in California, Nestos couldn't rely on their support, but she had the support of her sons. Although she couldn't provide them with trendy items in their childhood, she said it ultimately turned

them into humble and hard-working men.

"They recognized that I was doing something extraordinary ... alone," Nestos said. "So, they did a lot for me. I didn't have to ask them to keep up their rooms, get dressed in the morning or brush their teeth. We developed this mutual respect between the four of us."

After the end of her first marriage, Nestos said that she, for the first time, had 100 percent control over her own life. Initially, she feared that she was robbing her sons of a life with two parents, but then decided to maintain a positive mentality for the future of her children.

"I didn't have longer than a minute to have much self pity because of the task at hand. I was able to recognize that the situation wasn't going to change. I was able to focus on the gifts that came out of the marriage. It was very easy for me to put

their happiness and their future ahead of anything else I was going through."

After raising her children on her own for four and a half years, she decided to marry her current husband. They have been together 20 years and have had three more children.

Although Nestos said having three more children, each 18 months apart, was an even bigger challenge, the support of her older sons and husband helped her persevere. Nestos said the struggles she faced helped strengthen her relationship with her family.

"I believe I'm where I am today because of that struggle I went through. It taught me that I can stand on my two feet. I feel grateful every moment and that helps me have a sparkle in my eye, a smile on my face and a bounce in my step."

# JUST YOU WATCH



"I was in **AUSTRALIA FOR STUDY ABROAD**, taking this course called film studies. I wanted to do something out of my comfort zone, so I **SUBMITTED A SHORT FILM** called *Soul Food* to a film festival. Someone told me about a **SOUP KITCHEN** that looks like a restaurant. You walk in, sit down, a waiter comes to you and takes your order. The only difference was that you don't pay. We spent a week asking locals what they were most proud of, would build relationships with them and just talk. It was cool to be in the front lines of that; it was unique because I was an exchange student. **GETTING TO KNOW THE COMMUNITY.** The challenges were being a complete outsider from halfway around the world trying to shed light in such a short time. Having to share a story like that in five minutes is tough, but it just affirms that I have always **LIKED PUSHING MYSELF** to places that are uncomfortable."

"I've **CLIMBED MOUNT FUJI** two of the five times I've been to Japan. The first time I climbed it, I wanted it to be a perfect experience, [but] the weather didn't make that happen. The **WEATHER CONDITIONS WERE ABSOLUTELY HORRIFIC**; freezing rain, snow and wind. We couldn't see anything when we got to the top; the visibility was less than 10 feet. **THERE WAS NO POINT BEING UP THERE.** Sometimes you do something and want a certain outcome. You work really hard to do something then you're disappointed because you don't get rewarded. There are challenges that you don't necessarily plan for that you have to figure out. **MOUNT FUJI (MA) A GOOD LESSON** in patience, respect and that ability to live in that moment."

TO CELEBRATE STUDENTS' IDENTITIES

I always knew I was gay; however, in the 1980s at my suburban high school, I understood the overwhelming flood of negative cultural messages. So, I hid it. I had a girlfriend, pretended to be straight and yet was still targeted as gay by my peers. I had no adults in my high school whom I felt I could confide in. To tell anyone about the source of my fear would be to confirm the truth my peers used as a weapon against me. None of my teachers, at least none that I knew of, were out of the closet. I had no role models. Luckily, I found my safe spaces in choir, theater and speech team—places where I was not only accepted, but celebrated.

Flash forward to the early 1990s. I'm out of college and out of the closet. Living my life honestly and openly proved to be the antidote to my fears from the past. I discovered that coming out is a lifelong process, not a one-time event.

I began coaching competitive speech at a high school in Illinois. I found my calling in working with students, but I hesitated going back to a high school setting because of my negative past experiences.

Now, 21 years later, I have made it my educational mission to ensure that all students in my classroom feel cared about and celebrated for who they are, regardless of their differences. Whatever content I teach ultimately is a secondary focus. What's important is that my students have a great experience in my room—a place where they feel seen, heard and known for their authentic selves.

# GIVE IT TIME

GROWING UP WITH DAD WHO SUFFERED FROM BIPOLAR DISORDER GIVES SPECIAL EDUCATION INSTRUCTIONAL ADVISOR MS. BARBARA ROMAN UNDERSTANDING OF PATIENCE

**M**s. Barbara Roman was 10 years old when her dad disappeared to Las Vegas for a week. Instances like these are not uncommon when living with someone who suffers from bipolar disorder, Roman said. She seldom invited friends over to her house growing up because of her father's condition. Roman said it was especially hard for her dad when her friends would play pranks on him. "I got in my friend's car and said 'Let's drive,' and she kept honking the horn at my dad," Roman said. "My dad started to yell and scream at us from the driveway. ... Growing up with my dad, I learned a lot of patience." Roman said she has always felt a responsibility to help care for her dad, such

as helping him get to places on time. Due to his condition, there were many things he had to do before leaving the house. For example, he had to count to seven while completing everyday tasks. "He had a lot of rituals. He would get stuck in a ritual, and I would get nervous that I wasn't helping him enough to get ready in time." Although there were many difficult parts about living with her dad, Roman said that he had a side to him that not everyone was able to see. While his mental illness did greatly restrict him, he lived to be 80 years old, touching the hearts of the people closest to him. Her childhood experiences with her dad, Roman said, had an impact on her decision to become a teaching assistant for teens with special needs. She said that while adults with

mental illness are much different than teens with mental illness, patience is a common theme when caring for the two. "When a student has to complete a task we call it 'waiting it out.' People are very urgent now. When you work with special needs people, you have to be able to wait things out." Roman believes that all people with mental illness, including her dad, deserve to be respected. She said that with patience, people with mental illness are able to show their true value. "My dad had such a good sense of humor. He was also a very intelligent man. We are all people. You must realize that other people around you are as colorful and creative as you are."

"I had a friend who was **FAR MORE ACTIVE THAN I WAS**. He got me to run 5K races and [took me to] this nice bike shop. One day, there was a bike there I ended up buying. I hadn't been on a bike since high school, so on my first bike ride, I crashed. I came home after that ride and **LIT UP A CIGARETTE**, but it didn't feel right. I started to think about why I was smoking. I went out again to ride the next day, and I **CAME HOME AND STOPPED SMOKING**. There was something about being outside and being on the bike. It was hard to stop smoking, but I would come home from work and just start riding. **AFTER THE BIKE RIDE, I DIDN'T WANT TO SMOKE**. I miss smoking all the time but I know how bad it is, so even if I miss it, it's not something I would go to. When I think about that first bike ride, it led me on a different path. By buying that bicycle and stopping smoking, I **BECAME A HEALTHIER PERSON**."

"I was 25 when I saw an ad in the **LOCAL NEWSPAPER** that said, 'Looking for young professionals who are interested in going on a **YOUNG PROFESSIONALS' EXCHANGE**.' I became fascinated with the idea of prison and the guys who were stuck there. So, I volunteered at one. By working with an organization called Aunt Mary's Storybook, I record inmates reading books to their children. Then, I send the books and their recordings to their families. The combination of stressing literacy and helping to keep families together has been irresistible.

I'm always inspired by how these men read their books with passion and always have an "I love you" for their child or niece or nephew. The first month I attended, I watched a large, muscular, tattooed guy enthusiastically read "The Cat in the Hat" by Dr. Seuss to his child.

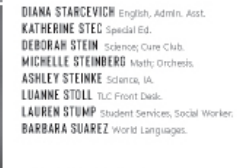
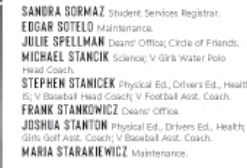
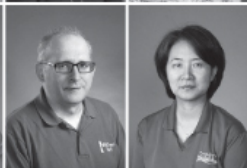

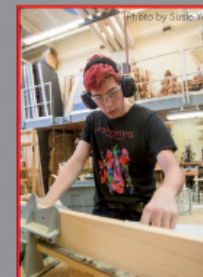

They met for a second summit in Hanoi, Vietnam on Feb. 27, 2019.

## JUNE 23, 2018 THAI SOCCER TEAM GETS TRAPPED IN CAVE

On June 23, 2018, 12 boys, ages 11-16, and their soccer coach, age 25, were declared missing after entering the Tham Luang Nang Non Cave located in a national park in Chiang Rai, Thailand. After entering the cave due to heavy rain, the passage that they entered through flooded so that they were unable to get out. Thai authorities informed the public of the boys' disappearance. After almost three weeks, all 12 boys and their coach were safely extracted from the cave by 13 foreign divers and five Thai Navy SEALs.

"I heard that the team was trapped in a cave, and the only way for them to get out was to swim. I was really surprised and scared for them. I think that when they were going through it, they were probably scared and didn't know if they were going to get out or not. After all that they had experienced, they probably felt really strong and like they had a unique story to tell."

## JAN. 18, 2019 FYRE FESTIVAL DOCUMENTARIES



FYRE, a failed luxury music festival, was supposed to take place on the island of Great Exuma of the Bahamas in 2017. The festival gained major attention when Hulu and Netflix created documentaries on the failed event in Jan. 2019. On April 28, 2017, several hundred attendees arrived expecting quality foods and housing as well as many other promises. However, they were forced to sleep in tents, and the only food came from a local restaurant. The creator, Billy McFarland, is facing a sentence of six years in prison due to charges of fraud. The festival was intended to promote the FYRE app, which would allow people to book musicians for events.

"I think they overmarketed it, and they didn't give enough time to fulfill everything they were going to do. It's kind of like Instagram in real life where you're doing something solely to be cool. Since a lot of it was advertised on social media, I think that it shows that people in our generation are easily tricked into believing anything. If one of our parents saw it, they would realize it's sketchy. But since we're younger, we don't see it because we're naive."

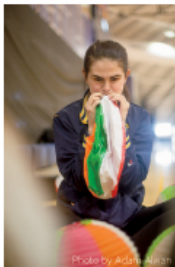

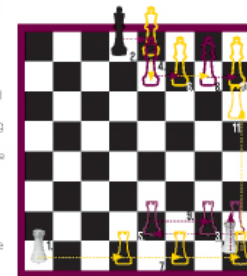
