"I chose to stay in Texarkana all summer and work at the Fun Park," he said. "As manager, I loved working there, and I definitely don't regret not



"This is by far the best part of the whole game," sophomore Alex Ouellette said,"just because we get to be together with everyone and celebrate the win."







The Hawks began their battle back to state with three big victories followed by a loss to Gladewater. After the first loss in over a year, the team then began to focus in on the details and used it as momentum for the rest of the season. At the end of the regular season, despite predictions that they wouldn't be able to repeat, they were district champions once again. As they headed to the playoffs, the letter writing began.

The tradition started the year before when Gibson decided to use the idea he had when teaching a Leadership Class earlier. He believed that if he could capture the team's heart, they would give him theirs.

"If I say we are going to be a close team, you have to foster and take the time to do those things to make us close." Gibson said. "I would have done anything for my dad. He was a coach and my hero so I believed that if I'd treat these kids like they are my sons, and they would treat each other like they are brothers, then they would do anything for the team."

"There's many memorable memories made throughout the season, but there's nothing like celebrating a big win with one of your teammates," Haley Hearn said.[CWattington]











But golf didn't only create long lasting friendships. With her consecutive district wins as an individual and team player, Alison took away than just golf tactics and skill.


"Throughout these past four years, golf has taught me that whatever has happened in the past I need to let it go and focus on what's coming next," she said.
