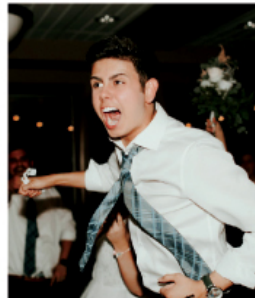

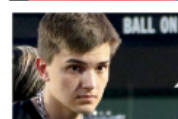

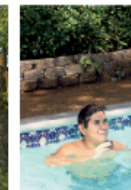

The ladies use social media to promote their channel. In fact, they got their channel name, Simplequal, by combining their Instagram names.

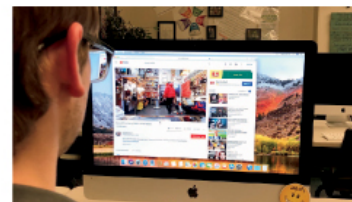
"Our channel name is basically our Instagram names put together," Yabushe said. Social media has increased their views tremendously. "We normally get around 300 views now," Yabushe said.

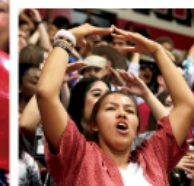

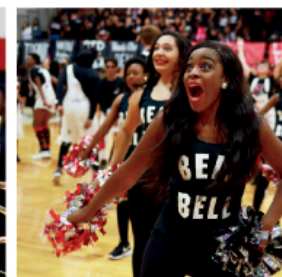

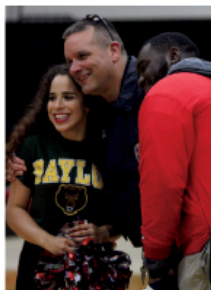

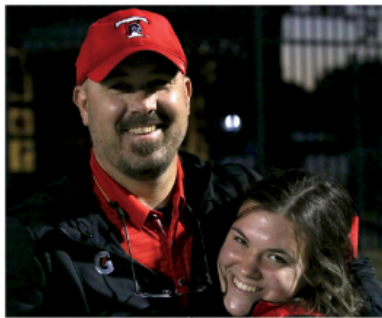

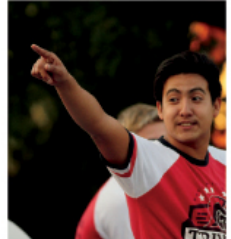

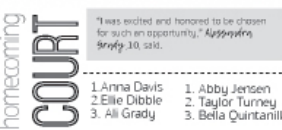

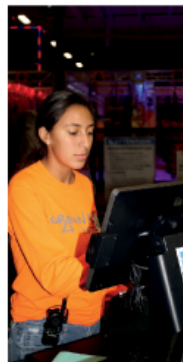

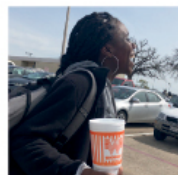

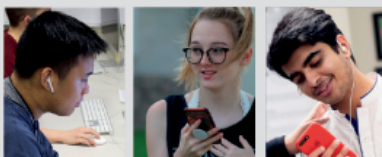

Thanks to their efforts, the gymnastics team was able to

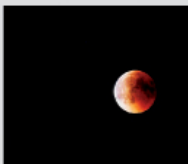


raise hundreds of cans for the local food pantry. Whether it was the community or their teammates, gymnastics had a habit of supporting others around them on and off the mat.

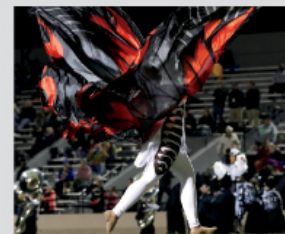

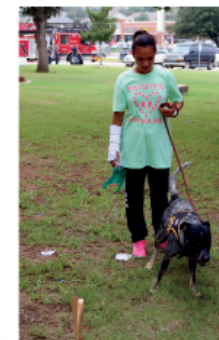

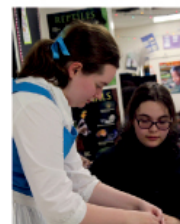

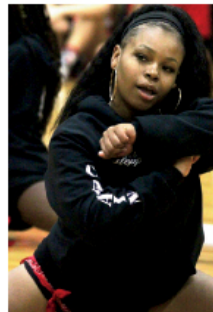

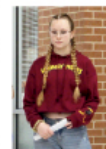

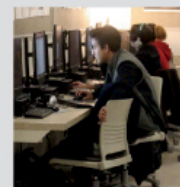

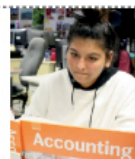

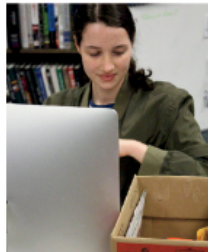

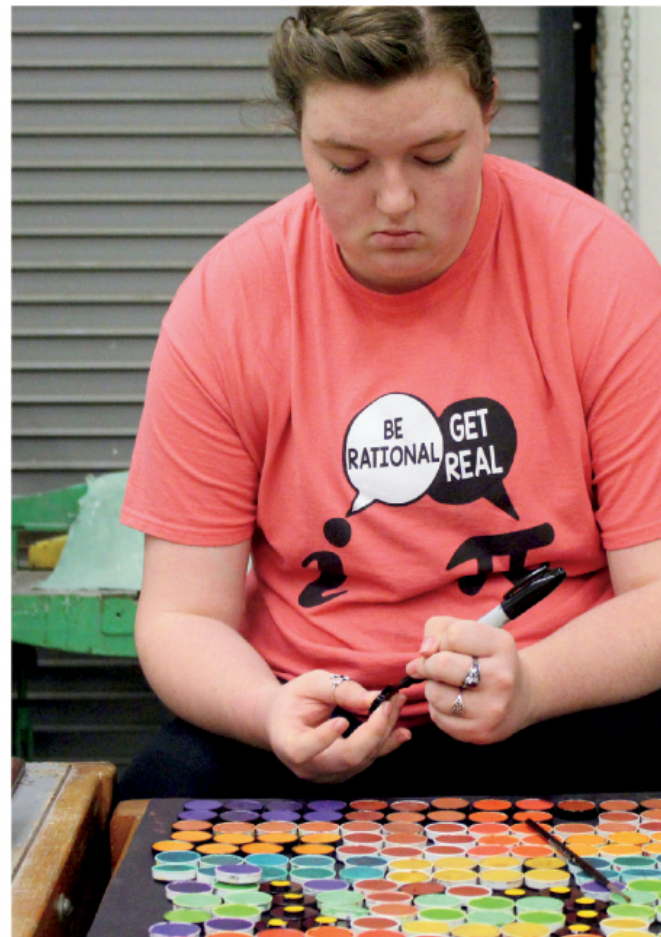

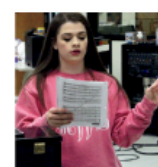

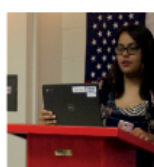

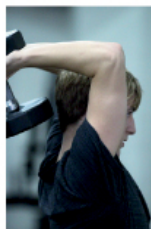

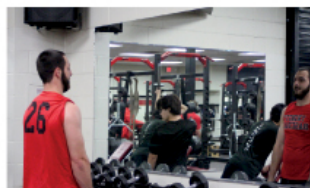

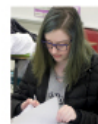

Sitting up on the hill at the edge of campus, S building contains students venturing its halls, exploring how humans and the world work, and growing as they apply it to their lives. Typically, the students would take notes then apply their concepts, occasionally participating in labs as well.

"In Biology we usually did a warm up and the teacher explained it, then we took notes for the rest of class. We also had labs based on what we were studying at the time. Some involved dangerous chemicals, while others did not," Alim Charania, 12, said.

In Chemistry and Physics, similar processes occurred. Even though different teachers and subjects took place, S building had a sense of cohesion that allowed students to have a thorough learning experience no matter the teacher.

"My favorite part of Chemistry was my teacher because she helped me understand what we were learning. I also liked doing the labs and watching reactions happen," Natalyn Suarez, 10, said.

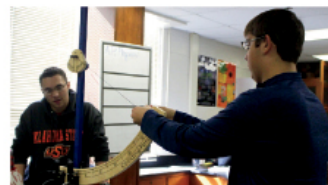

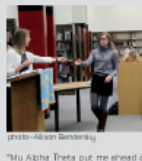

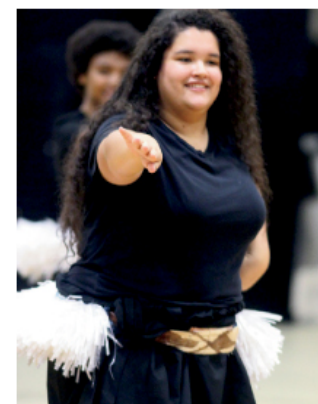

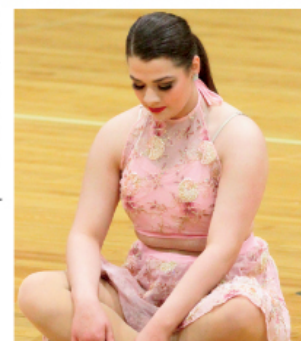

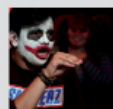

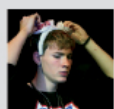

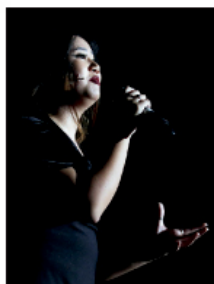

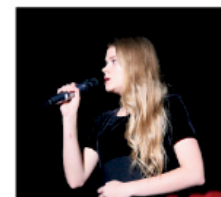

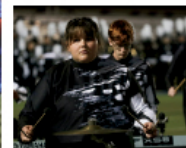

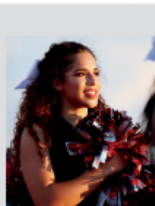

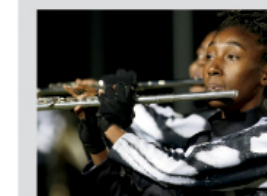

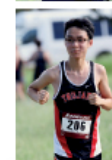

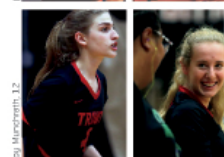

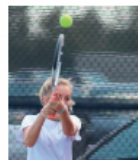

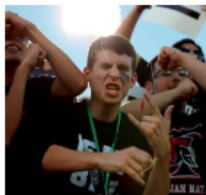

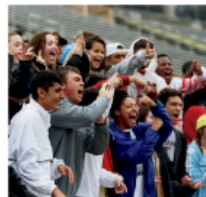

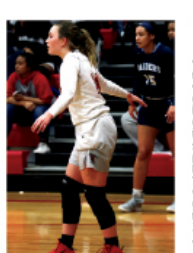
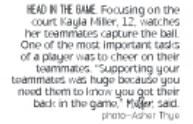

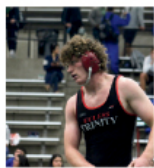

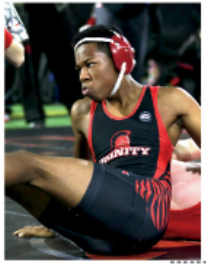

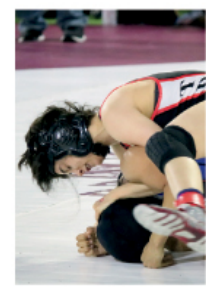

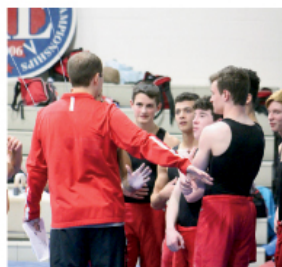

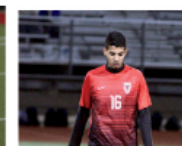

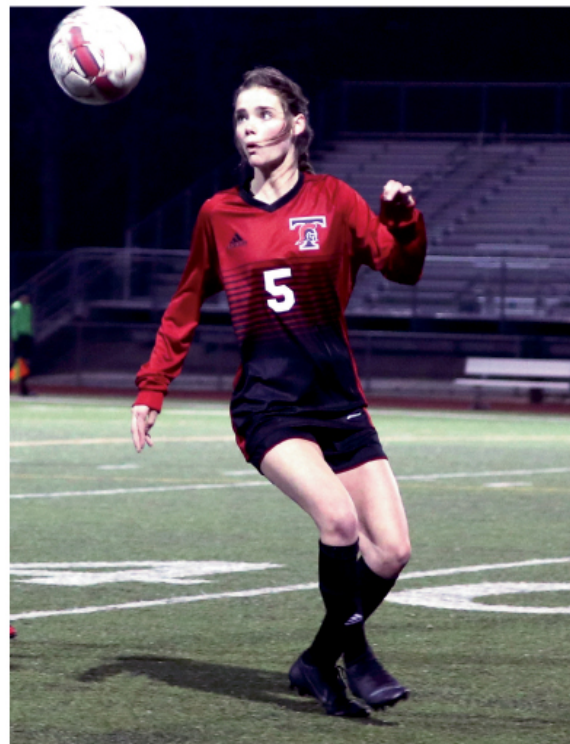

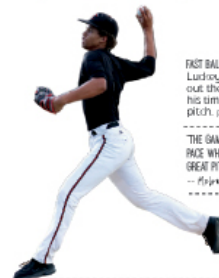

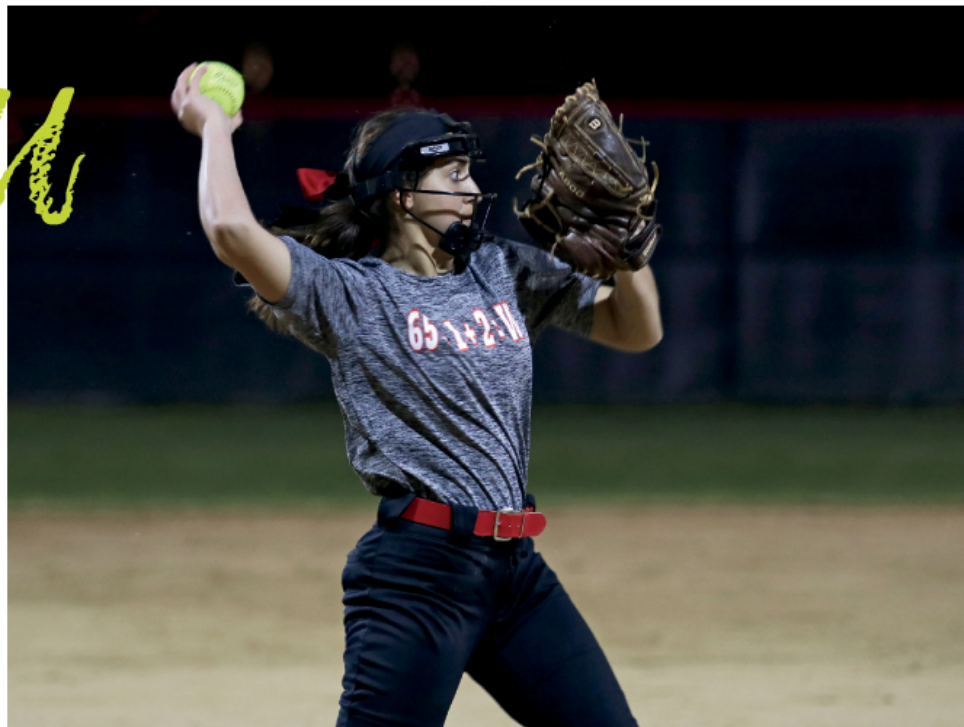

Superstitions have long prevailed in society, especially in sports. Softball was no outlier from this trend. From putting lucky pennies in their pockets, to tapping the base plate with the bat, players had long acted upon superstitions to boost their confidence in the game.

"I always played on first base during the games. Sometimes at the beginning I would tap the base for good luck," *Ashleigh Clark*, 12, said.

These superstitions, while they had not been proven to help in the game's outcome, helped get players into the right mind-set. Despite this improbability, a positive outlook had shown on multiple occasions to help players perform better. "I always had to have a bow in my hair for a game. 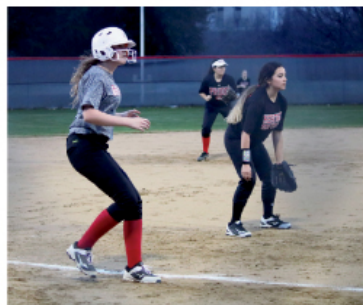

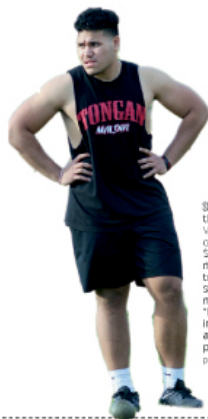

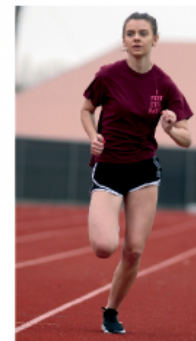

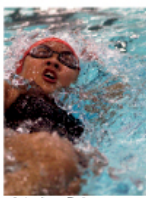

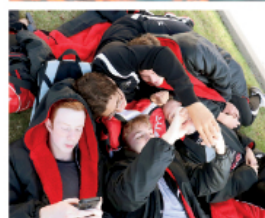

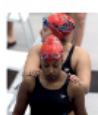

"I enjoyed listening to Mandisa and Christian, 80's, 2000's, and catchy beats," Amanda Berney, 10, said.

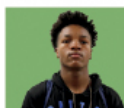
Friends and family often influenced the genres that students listened to.
